### BUSY WEEK WINDING UP SEAT CAMPAIGN

The United Seven Close Contest With Flying Colors Everywhere

### DAHLMAN FINALLY ENDS SILENCE

Remarkable Complaints Come From Voters Who Notified Their Votes Are Challenged—Newspaper Man Hears Many Funny Things In Moorhead's Office

The United Seven, composed of Dahlman, Butler, Koutsky, Hummel, Hopkins, Zimmin and Dunn have had a busy week and are winding up the municipal campaign with flying colors.

During the last week, these seven men have been putting out some big bids for votes. Mr. Dahlman broke his silence this week and consented to make a few speeches. Every place he visited immense crowds were on hand to hear him. At the various headquarters things have been lively, and in the Henshaw Hotel, where John Hopkins, one of the United Seven, has headquarters, the rooms have been crowded all day and well into the night.

The American Legion is one of the big organizations that is backing John Hopkins for a place on the commission. Leaders in the movement are leaving no stone unturned to secure victory for their man. Hopkins, who has an enviable army record, is a young Omaha attorney, full of vigor and a live and up-to-date candidate. He has been consistent in all things and served one term in the Nebraska legislature. His friends believe he will land right side up with care Tuesday and will be well up on the list when the votes are counted.

Former Mayor Dahlman, again a candidate for that place, continues to show abnormal strength. It is believed he will easily lead the ticket. Dahlman has up to Thursday night consistently refused to leave his duties as United States marshal, to take an active part in the campaign. He has explained that he has the greatest regard in the world for the position he now holds, and refused to leave it for a single day, until the federal judges gave their consent to him doing so.

There appears to be an almost universal demand for the return of Joe Hummel to the position of park commissioner. Hummel is known as the father of Omaha's park and boulevard system and nobody has a doubt in the world as to his ability to continue the activities he temporarily let go of three years ago.

Zimmin and Butler, two of the pres-

ent commissioners, also members of the United Seven, need no recommendations. They have been somewhat at outs with the other five men on the present commission, for the reason that they refused to be parties to the combines proposed by such men as Ringer, Ure and others. They are considered two of the strongest men on the ticket.

Attempts of the most villainous nature have been made by the 5000 bunch to discredit Henry Dunn, who is slated for Ringer's job. It is a remarkable truth that not a single word can be said against him with an iota of truth. He has nothing to defend himself against. He has been weighed in the balance and found not wanting. He is considered one of the best fitted men for the position of police superintendent that could be found in the western country. He has had twenty-eight years of actual experience and has not been a failure in a single position he has ever held. At present he is serving as police judge and even in this place he has shown himself 100 per cent pure, although he has been on the bench only a few months.

Joe Koutsky, the business man, needs no recommendation. One of the remarkable things about Koutsky is that not a single serious attack has been made upon him. He is a successful business man and promises to run his city job just like he has run his own business, which is sufficient in itself as clinching him as a commissioner.

Altogether, the United Seven is made up of such a substantial lot of men that even those few persons who might not like some of them will take a chance, as against the opposing combination. There is not a single weak spot on the United Seven slate.

The largest vote in the history of Omaha will be polled Tuesday. Many women will cast their first ballot. It is said that Dean Ringer expects much of his strength will come from the women. By those who have watched matters closely it is believed that is Ringer's biggest pipe dream. He has not given the women credit

### COMMON GOSSIP SAYS NOW IN COURT HOUSE

Election Inspectors Make Bad Impression In Many Places

### ELECTION COMMISSIONER PANNED

Popular Seven Has Strenuous Week In Final Rally For Places On City Commission—Many Interesting Things Said About Men Now In Race

"It is current gossip," said an observer of political doings in Omaha, "that the election commissioner's office has been leased to the Committee of 5000, better known as the Wead-Thomas-Murray combine, until after Tuesday. From all indications that gossip has had some foundation, from the evidence shown by the activity of so-called election inspectors."

This bit of political gossip came to the attention of a representative of The Mediator this week, and much has been heard from it on down town street corners all week. Harley Moorhead, election commissioner, however, smiled broadly at the assertion, and intimated that his office would run in the same old way, despite any gossip that might be heard.

Moorhead has been a very busy man the last two weeks. He has had his big squad of inspectors on the job, and those inspectors have been doing some mighty funny things, although Commissioner Moorhead declares their activities are covered by instructions, as offered by the laws governing election activities.

There has been considerable evidence the last week that some of these inspectors have overstepped themselves in trying to do their duty. The most active of these inspectors are apparently Ringer captains or pigeons, as one man put it. In numerous cases they have gone so far as to ask women if they were going to vote for Ringer. One North End woman had that sort of experience. She lives out on the Prettiest Mile.

A man called at her door, which she opened far enough to hear what he had to say. "Are you going to vote for Ringer," the inspector inquired displaying his authority for the call.

"That is none of your business," the woman replied, to which the inspector answered: "Well, I am an election inspector. There are a lot of people whose right to vote must be challenged and I am out looking up the people that are registered."

"Well you know my name," replied the lady. "It is none of your business who I am going to vote for," whereupon she slammed the door in his face.

Numerous reports have come out this week, indicating that somebody is using the election laws for intimidation purposes. Nearly all week there have been numerous callers at Harley Moorhead's office to make complaint about their right to vote being challenged.

When The Mediator man stepped into the office a young fellow was laying it down to a clerk for a fare-you-well. "I have lived here all my life, except while I was in France," he yelled. "My right to vote has been challenged and I am going to know the reason why. I am not going to stand for this business from the election commissioner or anybody else."

He was finally promised that his registration would be looked into and the matter adjusted. After he had gone away, Commissioner Moorhead admonished the clerk, "Don't talk to those fellows. You have all had your instructions."

Just what Moorhead meant by this remark was not explained.

There is evidence that somebody has been taking a hand in the "inspection business" beside Moorhead, but whether with or without the commissioner's consent is not known. Last fall before the big national election little or nothing was heard about activity in the election commissioner's office. During this campaign there has been unusual activity on the part of many of the so-called inspectors.

At the home of the editor, there has lived all his life a young man, foster son of the editor. This young man's vote was challenged, and nothing could be learned of the reasons. Moorhead, when the matter was explained to him said it was "very stupid of the inspector."

More has been heard of the election commissioner's work and more criticism indulged in than during any campaign since this office was created. Moorhead has been the only man to hold the place since the office came into existence. It is said he feels that he is an irremovable fixture, and his action in many cases has been considered arbitrary, to say the least.

## WHY SOME DYES ARE "FAST"

Vegetable and Animal Compounds Superior to Any Products of the Chemist's Laboratory.

Some dyes are "fast," others fade either when the goods are washed or when they are exposed to the sunlight. The fastness or otherwise of a color depends upon the arrangement of the atoms that make up its molecules. If these be closely interwoven, neither light nor water can separate them; but if they are loosely joined together light and water make them disintegrate. Most of our modern dyes are derived from coal tar and consist of atoms of carbon, hydrogen, oxygen and other elements. The vegetable dyes usually contain no other elements but carbon, hydrogen and oxygen. That is why, being so simple, such colors as logwood and natural indigo are the fastest of all. The few animal dyes—cochineal, for example—are fast for the same reason. But the so-called aniline dyes are the product of the chemist's laboratory and are complex and loosely bound combinations of the atoms of many elements. There are acid dyes and alkaline dyes, and before applying them to any stuff one must know whether the cells of this are acid or alkaline in reaction. For opposites attract, likes repel. Therefore we must use acid dyes for alkaline materials and alkaline dyes for acid materials.

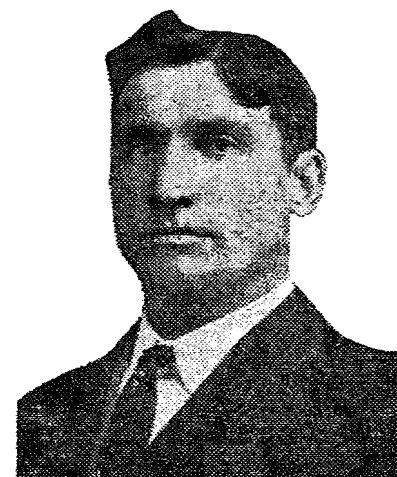
## DECISION CUT LEGAL TANGLE

Point Involved in English Lawsuit Seems Hardly Worth the Time and Money Expended.

On the last day of the last month in the year 1809 a very curious legal battle was fought between the English crown and a gentleman, lord of the manor of Holderness; it was a struggle for a cask of wine thrown upon the seashore on the coast of that particular manor.

The lord's bailiffs and the customs officers both raced to the spot and the contending parties each laid hold of the cask. Then the officers decided to go back to the custom house for further instructions, and during their absence the bailiffs removed the cask to the cellar of the manor house.

At the trial the arguments on both sides were very learned and exceedingly lengthy. The decision of the court was in favor of the lord on the grounds that no permit is required to remove spirits unless it has paid duty; that wine to be liable to duty must be imported; that wine cannot be imported by itself, but requires the agency of someone else to do it; that, therefore, wine wrecked, having come on shore by itself or without human volition or intention, was not imported, and was not subject to duty, and did not require a permit for its removal.—Chicago Journal.
