

ENGINEER JOHNSON WILL CONTROL

STATE OFFICIAL TO WAY CONTRACTORS

Kicks That Are Made Will Be Up to
That Official

TAXPAYER SAYS BEST ROAD BUILT

Contractor Says Ready to Follow Instruction—Would Like to
Know Where He Is At—Much Ado About Nothing—
Adams Glad to be off the Job

A fiasco, pure and simple, put out by some of the men who have been kicking about conditions which they make claim to being thoroughly familiar with, and still know absolutely nothing. This is the manner in which a man who has been watching the action of State Engineer Johnson, say the contractors have been building a tow-path, down along the Elkhorn river, near Valley. All this hullabaloo that has been going on over this road has been the veriest sort of talk with nobody but the state's road engineer getting any advertising out of the whole thing.

Now the county commissioners have washed their hands of the whole mess and told the state engineer that it is up to him to furnish the inspectors and see that they are on the job. From the beginning the state engineer, who has been doing all the kicking has been claiming that the inspection of the road was in the wrong hands. They first tried to throw the whole thing at the feet of Lou Adams. As a matter of fact Mr. Adams has nothing to do with road building, except in a prefatory way, and the following day to make report of what is actually going into the construction of the road. He has no authority to say whether or not the road is being properly constructed.

Johnson came to Omaha from Lincoln and raised a great hullabaloo. Some of the paving the county was putting its money across to build was being done in a manner that was not in keeping with specifications. He was backed by a bunch of fellows

who claimed they have been keeping a weather eye on the paving over which they are forced to drive and they find an inferior grade of work is being done. They want another man on the job.

Now, in order to get at the bottom of this trouble it is necessary to find out who this man Johnson is. He is presumed to know more about road building than any five men in Omaha combined and for that reason is a wise acre to all that is going on. A man who presumably knows all about the paving in that part of Douglas county and for that reason he has given this piece of work the once over and pronounced it perfect. He declined to talk about the matter unless his name was withheld, but had this to say: "This is one of the best pieces of road in Nebraska. I live out there and am forced to use it. There has been a lot of kicking on roads that are built in the country and there is a lot of kicking about this one. For one I have been riding this piece of road and have not found a single bit of it in a bad way. I am paying taxes on several parcels of property and am sincerely interested in what goes on in Douglas county. They can talk all they want to about this road, but everybody is getting his money's worth out of it."

This fellow lives close to the road in question. He has the best business in Waterloo, and gets about all that is coming to him in the way of county business and county work. He will probably have considerable to do with

SOFT DRINK PARLORS HAVE EASY TIME WHEN LANDED ON BY POLICE

Clarence Hawk Who Runs Place on Farnam Gets Friend to Front
For Him and Makes Getaway—Chris Rockholm
and Dutch Kahler Have Their Troubles

The people who have been "cheating" are having their fun with the police. Chris Rockholm who operates a lunch house on North Sixteenth street and has as nice a restaurant as they talk about, is one of the latest victims. The police dropped in and made him a call last week, and dropped right out again, taking a few bottles that were hanging around. The call was made without Chris being notified by the police of their intention to visit them. Sam Green who, with Dutch Kahler, had opened a soft drink place a few blocks north of Sam's place, was forced to go out of business, it was charged, they were cheating. Several other places were listed as undesirable and were raided by the morals squad.

The police, however, entirely overlooked the barber shops that have been getting away with everything except murder. They overlooked several places that have carried sidelines that could not be overlooked by those who called there to make purchases of wet goods. Some of these places derive their revenue from their bootleg activities and get away with it in an approved manner. One place that has been getting away with everything on the calender is a cigar store at 2516 Farnam street.

Hawk has a confectionery store, a barber shop and billiard parlor that all do business there. Besides that he runs a confectionery department with a small restaurant where he hands out sandwiches and coffee during the middle of the day. He has a fine place and

when nothing else is available he serves highballs to the waiting crowd at fifty cents per and gets away with it. He recently was picked up by the police and taken down to the station. When he appeared for trial a fellow who knew him fronted for him, and this man, being a man of some standing in the community, managed to secure Hawk's freedom. He took down his hundred bucks and managed to make his get away.

Now he is independent. He doesn't care for anybody and neither does the barber. He carries a big roll around in his pocket to meet his expense and lay down for his appearance. It is said that his next appearance before the judge will mean more than a fine. Hawk is some bootlegger and gets away with about everything he cares to try. His business is a nice little one, and he does not care who the buyer is. He came from the old home brew district where they put out the stuff in wholesale amounts at wholesale prices, and succeeded in placing himself in a class all by himself.

He has with him a barber shop addition, with the barber taking an active interest in the affairs of the other business of the place. Bert Edwards, who was formerly proprietor of the place committed suicide some time ago.

There are other places in the bootleg business that manage to get by without notifying the morals squad or having their soft drink parlor license revoked. But more of this business later.

DAY IN COURT FOR WILDCAT SALESMEN

Will Be Given Opportunity to Explain
Their Business

MANY OMAHA MEN ARE INVOLVED

Latest Attempt is Effort to Promote Fairbury Oil Lands—Ed.
Creighton Given the Credit for Putting Out Stock—
Many Omahans Caught in Net

There have been millions of dollars worth of hot air gone out from Omaha in the way of stock sales and stock dealing that should have been put into the children's mouths and into a farm or home for the babies that are coming up. Fellows have been selling stock like hot air and getting away with it. It is estimated by one person that fifty million dollars is a conservative amount for the fancy printed paper put and that the stock is not worth the paper on which it is printed.

At this time there is lots of it on the market. John D. Creighton is at the head of one of these concerns that is putting stock on the market with 27,000 acres of land as a basis on which the sales are made. Now it should be known that John D. Creighton is able to finance this thing himself but he wants the other fellow to do it. The scheme is something like this: The real promoters of this oil well are not known to the public. They arranged for the deal by which they hoped to get away by putting the name of Creighton at the head of the corporation. They expected to hold up the people by selling them stock in an oil well.

The promoters at once began to tackle the business men of the city for subscription telling them that Creighton was head of the corporation, with a bundle of money to make it go. As a matter of fact, Creighton never put a nickel in the concern. In order to get the drilling started it was necessary to sell some stock, otherwise it would be a dead letter. The agent tells you the whole thing. How the concern has a 27,000 acre tract near Fairbury or some other town with everybody piling over each other to get in first. It will not be a case of buy when you please but the first to come will be the first served.

And there you are. There will not be many left to tell about it unless

somebody stops the stock peddler. That is what it is now proposed to do. Attorney General Daugherty will start something in the near future he says to put an end to the stock salesman. As a matter of truth, the stock gambler has been going so far that there is little left to gather up.

The manner in which these fellows have been getting away with the easy money is far from a joke. Speaking of the great Creighton well one can get a very good idea of what is going on, by following their system a little.

Creighton went to Fairbury to look the business over himself. He found the land all right but there was no signs of oil. Telling his own experience, he said to quietly get a handful of the earth and crush it in your hands. I never saw anything like it in my life. It crushes easily and finally becomes mushy and soft and it feels oily as you handle the mud. It gets oily and that is all there is to it. We don't know whether or not there is oil in that ground, but there is something awfully funny about it. We are going to put down a well and find out.

If we strike oil we can do the rest in a short while. We will not need anybody to help. In the meantime they are selling shares at a good figure. This is the line of talk used to sell the stock.

George Roberts already is in about \$2,500 worth, and a lot of other Omahans are buying gobs of it. Luther Kountze has a load of it. Some of the fellows connected with the Merchants' National bank are holders and a lot of others have purchased. It is a great big desert and big enough to take in every man who has fifty dollars or more.

The attorney general soon will put an end to these speculations with a grand jury that will hear the evidence of men who have been floating the wildcat stuff. They will go into the

CHIEF DEMPSEY GIVES POLICE ORDER TO CLEAN HOUSE QUICKLY

Says Hook Them All, And Bring Them In—Must Go to Work or
Leave Town—Soft Drink Places Headquarters for
Loafers—No Alibis Go

Dance halls are coming in for a panning but the billiard parlors are having their own troubles as things go along. Now comes police Chief Dempsey with an order to clean up. He talked right out in school too, and told the Omaha coppers they were out to make a clean sweep.

"Bring them in and give them the once over," is the order. "We want them to either go to work or show the reason why. And that ends it. The fellow who is loafing around billiard halls, corner cigar stores or any other old place has to go to work or leave town."

All of which makes the town look like a slumming place. As a matter of fact Omaha is pretty well regulated and from all indications will continue to be with the police department doing its duty every day and then some.

Which puts us in mind of something. The soft drink joints are picking out the customers who patronize their places these days. Some of them are not so particular, but a majority of them know their men as quick as they step up to the bar. If they want anything except "suds" they are given the once over and

quickly told to make their get-away. They are wised up and quickly find the front door.

This is the business of running an up-to-date soft drink place. If you are not looking for anything but hard drinks, and are a stranger keep away from these places.

Dance halls and billiard parlors are not in the same class with soft drink resorts but they have the same sort of customers, who are looking for something for nothing. They are due for a cleaning. Questioned about the cleanup, Chief Dempsey said it was the regular thing and that his actions speak for themselves. "We will make these cleanups whenever conditions are such as demand them. The business of hanging around and letting the town support you is a thing of the past," he continued. "Everybody has got to go to work."

The man who works keeps out of mischief and that is what we are trying to make him do, he said. We cannot go along like the fellow who is waiting for something to turn up.

Every coper in the town was given instructions to get busy and to run in offenders who have been getting by without work.

INSURGENTS WILL INSURGE

Insurgents will insurge, even in an order so great and strong as the Woodmen of the World. That was evidenced at a meeting held Thursday evening at the Lyric theatre, in which half a dozen soreheads, guided only by an incentive to drive out one man, and to send the order to the bankrupt court made a bitter attack on W. A. Fraser of the Woodmen of the World.

The man behind this movement is a fellow named Claude Wilkerson, of Sedalia, Mo., a disappointed and dethroned office holder. The membership of the Woodmen of the World does not give a tinker's darn who is the head of that organization nor why. They are paying their camp dues, nearly a million members of them, and are getting all they pay for. During the war it was found necessary to raise the dues temporarily and some soreheads with more time on their hands than brains, and who had been thrown out of the Woodmen by order of the chief executive, started something.

It matters little to the membership who is the head of this institution so long as their money is taken care of. Few of them know who William A. Fraser is and care less. Fewer of them know anything about Claude Wilkerson or who he represents. There are nearly a million persons who are depending on the Woodmen to bury them. Many of them are about to cash in their policies or have somebody do it for them.

The question is shall they take up the fight of a disgruntled loafer, who never did anything for Woodcraft, or shall they stick to the old ship that has carried them through? This paper is not a spokesman for Fraser but it does feel that this man Wilkerson is an outsider, trying to get hold of the W. O. W. The people of Omaha cannot afford to take part in the strife, because the Woodmen had its beginning in this city and has built a fine building to house its army of employees, but they should not take a part in these wrangles that come periodically and have nothing to do with the people who are not connected directly with the Woodmen of the World.

WHAT HAS BECOME OF PRESIDENT WILSON?

What has become of Former-President Wilson and his crowd? Nobody knows what has become of him and his family. The former president dropped from sight when he dropped from the presidential chair.

This is not unusual but nobody seems to care whether Wilson is ever heard of again. Theodore Roosevelt had the courage to keep before the people and he was every inch a man until the last dog was hung and he passed in his checks. He had some remarkable experiences, including the unusual attempt to kill him by an assassin and met every occasion in a manner that caused him to be remembered by everybody alike, be he friend or foe.

Quite the reverse is the case of Woodrow Wilson. He tapered off a life that had been unusually active until the last few months before he left the White House. Not one person out of a hundred could tell you where he can be found, simply because he is out of public life for good. He made the trip to France and found Lloyd George there. He had not expected he would meet such an energetic fellow. That was the beginning of the end of Wilson. He was there to match wits and brains with the Englishman and did that and got the worst of the match.

Wilson came home literally "with his tail between his legs." He was plainly beaten by the Englishman, who got everything he went after. Much better would it have been had Wilson stayed at home. Lloyd George has the whip hand, when it comes to running Europe. He got everything he wanted from this country and is still getting it. Wilson had better have stayed right at home. The country would have been better off.

All we have to do now is to get busy and pay the bill. We have got the money and the quicker it is over with the better. We are up to our eyes in the Irish question and it will keep us busy letting England settle this little matter themselves, and not butting in and making fools of ourselves.

MUNICIPAL STATISTICS

City Commissioner Butler has assumed the practice, discontinued by his successor, of sending out his quarterly statistics. It shows the amount of funds on hand as of July 16, together with amounts spent by the various departments of the city government thus far during the year.

Incidentally, it also shows Omaha's bank balances August 1, showing an aggregate of \$3,808,018.08 on hand in actual cash. This indicates that the city is in a healthy condition and that we are not half as bad off as some of our sisters around the country. The city has a bonded indebtedness of about ten millions of dollars, that must be paid within the next twenty years, and in order to meet these bonds promptly there is being created a sinking fund for that purpose.

Of this amount, however, \$3,801,808 becomes due during the next ten years, leaving nearly seven million dollars due in the following ten years. In other words, the future generation will have

to take care of all of our obligations, which will be no small job. The taxes are made up on the basis of an increased business and an added amount of taxable property.

The budget is an important piece of business and it is very good of Mr. Butler to give his reports to the public, in order that the taxpayer may know where his money is going to.

POLICE OFFICER'S BROTHER IS AS OMAHA HOOTCH KING

One of Omaha's hootch kings turns out to be the brother of an Omaha police officer. Thus far he has escaped arrest or even being suspected, it is reliably stated. Some of his customers have been "knocked over" recently. He specializes in home brew, but also has receipts for the choicest poison on the market it is stated. He drives around town in a big limousine, accompanied by his wife. This limousine serves also as his delivery truck. He has been defying the authorities, intimating that he is protected by his brother, who is a police officer. Some of these officers were asked about the business and declared this man Rosy as he is known, had to fight his own battles, and that he was taking his own chances.

Down in the East End, where Rosy does the most business, he has lots of friends, all of whom are out to protect him as long as they can get their usual allotment of suds at fifty cents per quart. It is said the authorities have taken cognizance of this beer peddler and that even our prohibition commissioner, Mr. Rohrer has had his attention called to this thriving line of business.

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
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

NOTICE OF ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE GREAT DOME HOLDING AND DEVELOPMENT CO.

Notice is hereby given that on December 1st, 1921, the undersigned duly adopted articles of incorporation in substance as follows:

1. The name of this Corporation is "The Great Dome Holding and Development Co."

2. The principal place of business shall be in the city of Omaha, Douglas County, Nebraska.

3. The general nature of the business to be transacted by said Corporation is to purchase, own, rent, maintain or acquire by devise, gift or otherwise real and personal property in addition to that necessary or expedient for the carrying on of its business to be used in conducting a general real estate business and to hold, develop, operate, lease, sell, contract and convey with reference to such real and personal property as may be deemed necessary and proper in the premises; to drill for oil and gas and in connection therewith to sink, construct, maintain and operate wells and equipment for such drilling and for the extraction and handling and disposition of oil and gas; and to build, erect, construct, maintain and operate oil refineries for the purpose of refining oil and gas, and to treat and refine such oil and gas; and to build, equip, maintain and operate casing head plants for the treatment of gas and the extraction and making of gasoline and all by-products; and to build, equip, maintain and operate filter plants and rectifying plants and skimming plants for the treatment and handling of oil and gas; and to buy, hold, sell, barter and exchange crude, refined distilled and rectified oil and all by-products of the same; to mine for minerals of all kinds and to develop all kinds of mines and mining property, and all kinds of mining machinery, implements and apparatus pertaining thereto, and to refine, smelt and mill all kinds of minerals; and to do any and everything necessarily incident to the mining or refining of minerals of all kinds; to purchase, acquire, hold, sell, negotiate, exchange and transfer oil, gas and mineral leases; and generally to do all things necessary or generally incident to the oil, gas and mining business; all of the foregoing within the State of Nebraska or in any other state or territory or district of the United States; to borrow money and issue paper therefor, and to secure the payment thereof by hypothecating any of its property, real or personal, or to pledge its real or personal property, or both; to do any and everything whatever that may be reasonable necessary or incident to the carrying on of any of the business or purposes hereinbefore mentioned in any state or territory in the United States.

4. The authorized capital stock shall be Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) divided into Seven Hundred and Fifty (750) shares of the par value of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) each and said stock shall be fully paid for when issued and shall be non-assessable.

5. This corporation shall commence doing business immediately upon the filing of its Articles of Incorporation with the County Clerk of Douglas County, Nebraska, and shall continue in existence for a term of (50) years, unless sooner dissolved voluntarily or by operation of law.

6. The affairs of this Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Directors of not less than three (3), nor more than seven (7) members, who shall hold regular meetings at least once a month at the home office and who shall elect from among their number a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, any two of which offices, except that of President and Vice President may be held by one and the same person and shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Stock Holders, excepting the first Board of Directors, which shall consist of the following named Stock Holders—H. M. Greenway, C. M. Hiatt, Joseph Rogers, Bert Hiatt, Charles McWilliams, who shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified.

7. The Board of Directors shall have power to make, alter or amend such by-laws as they may deem necessary and proper for the maintenance and management of the affairs of this Corporation.

8. The first annual meeting of the Stock Holders shall be held in the City of Omaha, Nebraska, on November 15th, 1921, and yearly thereafter; and that at the first annual meeting, aforementioned, the Corporation shall elect new officers, whose term of office shall be until the next annual meeting of the Stock Holders.

9. These Articles of Incorporation may be amended at any regular or special meeting of the Stock Holders called for that purpose, upon such notice as may be provided in the by-laws, by a majority of the Stock Holders.

10. The highest amount of indebtedness to which this Corporation may, at any time subject itself, shall not be in excess of two-thirds (2/3) of its capital stock.

11. The seal of the Corporation shall be circular in form upon which shall appear the words, "The Great Dome Holding and Development Co., Corporate Seal, Omaha, Nebraska."

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR AUTOMOBILE LENSES

Every lens which has been approved by the Department of Public Works has passed the same set of specifications which have as their basis the necessity of plenty of properly controlled driving light.

The following regulations have been issued by the Department of Public Works and police officials who have been asked to see that they are enforced on and after July 23rd:

1. Two white lights are required on the front and one red light on the rear

of every automobile used at night.

2. Spot lights may be used provided they project their light directly on the ground and at a distance not exceeding 30 feet in front of the car.

3. Diffusing lenses will not be approved by the Department and their use is prohibited. It is impossible with a lens of this type to control the light so that with a sufficient driving light there will be no glare. Examples of diffusing lenses are: Warner, More-Light and Perfection.

4. Gas or oil lamps need not be equipped with approved lenses.

5. Electrical headlights using a bulb of more than 4 candle power must be equipped with an approved lens. No bulb shall be over 24 candle power.

6. Plain glass lenses will not be permitted, even though they are in a headlight which may be tilted by means of a lever controlled from the driver's seat.

7. Home made devices will be prohibited. While these devices to a certain extent eliminate glare, the driving light as a rule is reduced below the required minimum. Under the law, the Department of Public Works is required to approve every lens used; and if homemade lenses were submitted for approval by everyone making them, the fee for the examination of the lens would be prohibitive for those desiring to use them.

8. The Standard Ford Green Visor headlamp has been scientifically designed and is machine made, and in the test has passed all of the requirements.

9. Frosted bulbs are prohibited. With a lawful lens, they are not necessary.



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Back of the transmitter diaphragm of your telephone there is a small brass drum partly filled with carbon, crushed to about the size of granulated sugar. The drawing, enlarged in the circle at the right, shows the interior of the drum.

The function of the carbon granules is to take the sound vibrations from the diaphragm and send them out over the wires in various impulses.

If the telephone is leaned backward as you talk the voice will have a far away sound because the little granules pack against the diaphragm and the voice will sound muffled to the listener.

The telephone will render the most effective service when its base rests on a level surface and you talk directly into it, with the lips about one inch from the mouthpiece.

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
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
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
