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#### RECEIPTS ONLY \$452,000

FOR twelve minutes of excitement, under a sun that furnished 117 degrees of heat, the sports of our country paid \$452,000 into the coffers of fight promoters at Toledo. Tex Rickard, we are told, had expected the receipts would reach a million dollars.

It is of little consequence how many concessionaires were trimmed,—according to reports they were all dumped,—but it is interesting to note that the great pugilistic game is still popular with which money was intended for such a untold multitudes of people. All the \$60 and \$50 seats were sold, we are told, but the \$5 seats went begging. This probably means streets. ### HIGH PRICES CAUSE DIVORCE SUITS

IT is charged that the high cost of living is causing an avalanche of divorce suits. Be that as it may, twenty-five such suits were instituted during one day this week and fifteen another. It is estimated that these suits, together with others being filed right along, will occupy the entire time of at least one and probably two district court judges for more than a whole term.

This is a pretty serious proposition, both from a domestic and from a judicial standpoint. Omaha has been doing a thriving business in divorces for many years. Among the hundreds of such suits filed recently are many which come as a result of the war. But the high cost of living doubtless is one of the primary causes of a large number of these suits.

The condition is in no wise a healthy one when a man seeks a divorce because he cannot earn enough money to feed his family, even though it may be a small one. Within the week we have read where the primary meat markets are so overstocked that it is becoming a question whether or not much of this meat will be destroyed for want of consumers. In the same week comes the report that coming crops will be greater than in all history and that the stocks already on hand are twice greater than ever before.

When we get to the market page we find that all food commodities are soaring higher daily, despite this immense production and great stores of food already on hand. It is a condition that will require the immediate attention of the government. It is a condition that has already got away from the economical managers of the country. There has got to be a halt and that very soon. Otherwise a condition will be raised that will not only increase the divorce business, but will cause an unrest that may develop into something more serious than even the recent world war.

Politics is bound to be the cause of further distress in the food business and the political leaders who promise to create a return to normal food conditions and prices are going to be the men who will stand out in front during the next two years. If our republican friends want to get into the limelight they better take stock of their political assets and pledge themselves to something that will give relief to the common people who are half-starving with every granary in the country bulging. That will also go for the democrats.



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
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
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
