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REPUBLICAN CANDIDATES AND THEIR PLATFORM.

The dye has been set and the scrap for political preference Francisco convention. is on, so far as the republican party is concerned. Their convention nominated Senator Warren G. Harding for president last Saturday and put Governor Coolidge of New Hampshire in second place.

Opinions differ considerably as to whether the republican party has in any manner strengthened its position through its work at Chicago. From a platform standpoint, there was nothing constructive in their work as the general public views the affair. Senator Harding is what might be called a "conservative," as is also his running mate, Coolidge. Union labor has already put its brands of disapproval on the work of that convention.

Because of physical incapability of President Wilson the last congress, operated by the republicans, took advantage of every opportunity to make political capital while the sun was shining. How much it really accomplished remains to be seen. The big issue of the republicans is this: "We need a change and it will take the republican party to fathom and correct all our troubles.' That is all there is to either their platform or candidates.

The democratic convention at San Francisco will have an unusual opportunity for real action. If they put up a strong front, with proper candidates and platform, they will have little to fear. The refusal of the republicans to mention the wet and dry issure may be taken advantage of by the democrats to do a lot of good for themselves. If they do not let William J. Bryan dominate the affairs of the convention they should emerge in shape to retain their position as a power in American politics.

During the coming campaign will be heard some remarkable speeches and much bitterness of tone may be expected from both sides when the spellbinders are turned loose on the public. As a constructive machine, the republican party convention gave evidence of being a cipher. They advocated nothing that gave evidence of anything progressive and practically admitted that they stood for the old order of things which would hold down the interests of the common men as against the capitalist. They showed absolutely no sympathy with labor and left the impression that the first acts of the party, once it comes into power, will be to start a general movement for the reduction of wages.

Already there is a promise of revolt among the progressive element of the party which will hold another convention in the near future to organize a bolt from the old line organization. It will be much like the one started four years ago by Colonel Roosevelt and if the result is as disastrous as it was at that time, it will prove conclusively that the recent republican national convention was an abject failure.

Although the democrats have been in power for eight years, they still have the opportunity of their existence to go on record at San Francisco in a manner that will insure them another four years of control of the affairs of government.

ANOTHER NEGRO LYNCHING.

The city of Duluth has just witnessed a despicable lynching affair, in which three negroes were victims. The south no longer has a corner on these disgraceful affairs. Our own good Omaha recently pulled one off, for which Douglas county is now paying the bill. The Duluth affair appears to have been handled along the same line as the one in Omaha, only that the mob of 5,000 hung three men instead of one.

A passing circus was in Duluth and carried a number of negro roustabouts. Some fiend assaulted a white girl and the arrest of the three negroes followed. The frenzied lynchers said: "We don't know which one did it, but we'll lynch them all, and not miss the right man."

Nothing can be more detestable than the assaulting of a white woman, but let it be known that there are plenty of white degenerates who have been caught at the same business. The number of white men lynched, even when evidence against them was conclusive, has been very limited. Lynching is none too good for such fiends, but the practice of charging a negro with every such crime committed and stringing him up to a pole without a chance to prove his innocense is absolutely indefensible.

The law provides the same defense for the colored man that it provides for the whites in such cases. There is absolutely no defense for lynch law except where the evidence is conclusive, and drawing the color line in assault cases is not to be defended in any instance.

NEW AMENDMENT CODE, WHY NOT?

Amending the constitution of the United States has become a popular sport, and it ought to be encouraged. It has just been | discovered that the tastes of the nation for beverages may be changed by constitutional amendment. Mr. Bryan proposes that the double standard of morality be abolished in the same manner.

Changing our national constitution has become quite a tad and there is no reason why that fad should be abolished until we have gone all the way down the line. For instance, there is absolutely no reason why the use of tobacco in all forms and the

manufacture and use of candy should not be abolished via the constitutional amendment line of progress.

There are many other articles which are luxuries, to say the least, that should be absolutely done away with in this manner. The average user of tobacco can get along without candy and the perpetual candy connoisseur might easily permit the prohibition against tobacco. The former user of intoxicating beverages has been denied his favorite beverages and the supreme court has declared the amendmnet o. k. For all of which reasons all the tastes of the people might be easily regulated, even to the extent of limiting the amount of plain water that might be consumed by one individual.

It has also been suggested that all of the Ten Commandments be revised to fit in with new conditions as they are being developed in America, and especially through amendments of our national constitution. The New York Tribune says the Commandments might have been all right in Sinai, but, according to our present day reformers they might be amended and even improved upon, in order that they might better be adapted to present day vagueries.

All of which may sound hysterical until we hesitate long enough to consider how far we have gone along that line already. If these amendments are good for us why not have plenty of

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

To talk to a person is to address words to him; to talk with a person is to speak and listen alternately-to carry on a conversation; to talk of cerning him; to talk at a person is

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
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


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
