## POLITICIANS MAKE THEIR STRONG BIDS

### McKelvie and Morehead Insert Their Prohibition Record.

## COUNTY AND CITY OFFICES DESIRED

### Germans Show Their Hand and Are Ready to Knife Their Adopted Country—Ex-Kaiser May Be Next Republican Nominee for President of United States.

Politics reached the fever-heat stage this week and in Omaha, just as in other parts of the country, politicians are now making the run of their lives for offices for themselves and their friends. Of course, the chief interest, so far as the big fellows are concerned, centers in the candidates for president of the United States, but the little fellows seeking county and city offices are making things pretty hot locally.

The Germans are breaking their necks to defeat Governor Cox for president, and right here in Omaha the scrap is about as good as any place in the country. Just now, the American people are learning that the German people are still German and that, instead of being out boosting for his adopted country, he is putting in his knocks as strong as he did until stopped from activities when we were called upon to lick Germany in the genuine American way. Most of these fellows are fighting Cox because the democrats led the war van that put the German out of business in Europe for all time to come. It is reliably reported that, in the event of German success in America this year, the ex-kaiser is to move over here and run for president on the republican ticket four years hence.

Locally, there are a lot of people in hot water. Governor McKelvie and John Morehead, aspirants for the governorship, are into the fight up to their necks. Prohibition has entered into their fight and both McKelvie and

Morehead are trying to work both sides against the middle. Both of them are as wet as seadogs, but they have different systems of putting on their big doings. They have both had their "dries" in Omaha since the country went dry, but both are inviting the booze hounds to go through their homes and search for wet goods.

These fellows both better have let the booze question drop. McKelvie had a party here once and his crowd was pinched at the Fontenelle hotel, when a liberal supply of wet goods was taken. When the governor is at home he is as dry as any other high-class republican and is said to even go to church. It is not the governor's record on booze that is making him trouble, however, but a lot of other things that he has done during his two years' incumbency of the state house. Morehead was governor once himself. He has been stumping the state for re-election, and he, too, has had a few things to say about prohibition and his Nebraska City record on the question. As a matter of fact, Morehead is as wet as McKelvie and when he comes to Omaha his hotel room is usually pretty well stocked with the stuff that intoxicates. On a recent visit, the former governor got fairly well tanked up himself. The editor of this great religious weekly newspaper had an opportunity to get an insight into things at that time and knows about what was going on. It is useless to enter into details at this

## BASEBALL SLATED FOR ANOTHER GRUELING AND REVOLUTION TALK

### Ban Johnson Heads Holdouts of Big Leaguers who Refuse to Join Up With Heads of Organized Baseball—Minor Leagues Are All Affected.

A baseball war, slated each year by some of the "maggots" in the big leagues, is again at hand. The cause of the latest big doings is said to be the scandal that crept into the game when the White Sox crowd got caught dabbling in world championships and which all but blew up that team this last season.

As usual, the major league bosses, or a majority of them, wanted renewed the combination by which baseball territory is divided and organized baseball shall work under the old system. This year there have been five holdouts in the ranks of the sixteen major league clubs, and this holdout business is what is now disrupting baseball.

It is said that the eleven other members of the big leagues have decided to form one major league of twelve clubs, in the event of the five holdouts fighting their battle to a finish, and meeting the new condition in the best manner possible. In some respects the old Federal league proposition is indicated by the activities of those who have been dissatisfied. All of the big league teams have been making a lot of money this year and a combination of five would be a pretty strong one. It is said they have already financed a proposition which may take on new life at any time.

In fact, it is said Johnson has in mind the formation of two new circuits, which would affect a lot of the minor leagues now working under the national agreement.

Organized baseball got onto its feet after the war and much had been expected from it in the next few years. Apparently Johnson has something up his sleeve and intends to make a lot of trouble before he changes his mind, if he changes it at all.

Omaha, of course, is interested in all league changes because this city has been the center of the baseball "vortex" for a number of years and has had its own troubles, so far as baseball is concerned.

By the wise ones, it is claimed Johnson will sooner or later come to time and get back with the big crowd, which will put the game back where it has always been, with an iron-clad and air-tight organization.

There will be a meeting of minor league owners in Kansas City in less than three weeks when new conditions will be discussed and when, it is expected, more will be known of what may be expected from Ban Johnson and members of the big leagues.

## COURT RECORD SAYS SHE VAMPED ZWEIBEL

### Sensational Charges Made by Mother of Grass Widow's Husband.

## PHYSICIAN'S REPORT FORCES ISSUE

### Clippings From Court Records Throw Light on Doings of Woman Who Sues George Roberts for Million Dollars—Woman Was Known in Other Cities.

Recent filing of a petition in the district court, in which Dorothy Weston sues George A. Roberts for \$1,000,000, in trested a great many people, and particularly those who have been wondering just whom Dorothy Weston really is. Dorothy's humble claim for a cold million dollars naturally caused considerable amusement as well as unusual interest because of the high price she placed on her alleged suffering.

Since the filing of the suit some remarkable history has been turned loose, and it has also developed that Dorothy is a grass widow, having formerly been Dorothy Weston Zweibel, wife of a mere boy, according to a petition for annulment of marriage filed by the child's mother last January.

This petition is full of sordid charges, among them being one to the effect that Dorothy, after being married to young Zweibel several months, told him she had been examined by a physician and that she could not occupy the same bed with him for a period of six months.

According to the petition, filed by Nora Hoon, mother, "natural guardian and next friend" of young Zweibel, Dorothy herself secured the license to wed young Zweibel and by threats and coercion forced him into the marriage. In this connection, the petition says: "That the plaintiff William E. Zweibel and the defendant were married on or about the 4th day of May, 1919, in the city of Omaha, Nebraska, and lived together as husband and wife until on or about the 18th day of October, 1919.

"That the plaintiff Nora Hoon is

the mother, natural guardian and the next friend of the plaintiff William E. Zweibel.

"That the defendant on or about the 18th day of October, 1919, after having been examined by a physician, told the plaintiff William E. Zweibel that she could not for a period of six months live with the plaintiff, William E. Zweibel, nor during any of said period of time occupy with the said William E. Zweibel the same bed, separate beds being required for the said William E. Zweibel and the defendant. "That on the 4th day of May, 1919, the plaintiff William E. Zweibel and the defendant were both minors under the ages of twenty-one and eighteen years respectively and incompetent to enter into the contractual relationship of husband and wife.

"That the defendant secured the license to wed for the plaintiff, William E. Zweibel, and the defendant without the knowledge or consent of the plaintiffs. That prior to and after the defendant secured said license to wed she induced the plaintiff, William E. Zweibel, to enter into said marriage relation, through threats, coercion and fraud in that the said defendant told the plaintiff, William E. Zweibel, that she was being threatened by her mother and brother to be cast out of home if she continued to keep company with the said William E. Zweibel or if she married him and further that her mother and brother threatened her with personal violence in the event of her marrying said William E. Zweibel and that she needed the protection of the said William E. Zweibel and that she could

## "RELIGIOUS WINES" CAUSE MUCH TROUBLE FOR OMAHA DISPENSERS

### Charges Made That Local Church Supply House Is Not Confining Business to Legitimate Lines—Many Alibis for Illegal Possession. Says Official.

Now comes the report that an Omaha church goods house has violated the national prohibition laws, by putting out a big supply of "wet goods," that were presumed to be sold only for sacramental purposes, to others than those who wanted to use these wines for observing religious rites.

Some of our Jewish friends are being panned by the authorities because of the large supply of church wines that has made its appearance from time to time to be used for religious purposes. As a matter of fact, the law itself makes provision for the manufacture, purchase and sales of these wines, and that is all there is to it. But some of the jealous fellows, some of them in official positions have been making a big how-do-you-do about the dispensing of these wines and one state's attorney has intimated that he will investigate the business as it is transacted in Omaha.

During the recent Passover festivities, the Jews of Omaha and all other parts of the country observed the feasts in the usual manner. The wine provided for the occasion came to Omaha under government supervision and dispensers had full authority to act in the matter. It is said this wine was not very intoxicating, even if consumed in large quantities, and that it

was dispensed to the large Jewish population in Omaha quite in accordance with the requirements of the law.

Of course, it is easy to conceive how unscrupulous dispensers might put "religious wine" on sale indiscriminately, but as a general proposition the privileges have not been abused and Jews consider sacred the privileges which have been conferred upon them and which permit them to observe feast days in the manner provided by their customs.

Joe Batt, who was charged with overdoing the "religious wine" business, has been on trial, and it was during his trial that the matter was brought up by the state's attorney. Thus far the records do not show that any of our Jewish friends have been putting on parties with sacred wine and none of them have been found intoxicated as a result of their religious festivities.

Many funny things happen these prohibition days, and it is said the authorities are non-plussed with the alibis that are coming to them every day for the possession of intoxicating liquors. One official said: "Every body is doing it. I find some of our best church people are out with excuses for illegally possessing liquor."

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### NEBRASKA OPPOSED TO GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP

The Nebraska public is overwhelmingly opposed to radical government experiments according to the results of a questionnaire on the subject of government operation of industries sent out to the editors of this and the other states of the country. Of the 205 editors who replied, 163 or 80 per cent said that the citizens of their communities were opposed to the government going into business in competition with its citizens.

The questionnaire was sent out by the Press Service Company of New York City. While the inquiry was based on the general principle of government operation, the so-called Mussel Shoals bill now before congress was used as a concrete example. Under this bill a government-owned corporation would be given power, among other things, to produce at Mussel Shoals various fertilizer products and sell them in competition with private manufacturers and dealers.

As to the wisdom of the government adopting this policy toward the fertilizer industry the editors were asked for their personal opinion. Of the 185 editors who gave an opinion on this point, 148 or 80 per cent were unqualifiedly opposed to the scheme.

The political affiliations of the Nebraska papers whose editors answered the questionnaire were: Republican, 67; democratic, 32; independent, 82, and miscellaneous, 24.

A summary of the results of the questionnaire from the country at large shows that this opposition to government operation is general. Out of 5,154 editors replying, 4,466 or 86 per cent voted their communities against the proposition. This is an increase of 3 per cent in the opposition as compared with the results of a similar questionnaire sent out by the Press Service Company a year ago in connection with the question of turning the railroads back to their owners.

The papers heard from in the present poll are 1,857 republican, 1,350 democratic, 1,458 independent and 462 miscellaneous. Not only did political bias play no part in the replies but sectional differences seem to have no appreciable effect on the result. The combined circulation of the papers whose editors replied is 11,428,817, which means a constituency of at least 44,000,000 readers.

only give such protection by entering into the marital relation with the defendant. That the representations above were false and untrue and for the sole purpose of causing the plaintiff, William E. Zweibel, to marry the defendant and did cause the said marriage as aforesaid."

Following the filing of this petition by Mrs. Hoon, it is stated, negotiations were entered into by which a cross petition was filed which resulted in the court granting a divorce and ending Dorothy's married relationship with the Zweibel child.

It also appears that Dorothy has been something of a traveler and has been known in other Nebraska cities. The nature of her business in other cities, it is said, has become an issue in this case and will be brought out in due time.

An Iowa convict, now on parole, is said to have interested himself in the case to the extent of calling on Mr. Roberts in connection with the Dorothy Weston suit. He has been best known in Omaha as a hijacker. For Mr. Roberts, it is stated that he will meet the issue squarely if it gets into court, and that there will be no compromise.

Those who are interested in the defendant's side of the case say it is an attempt to hijack him because he is a

reputed millionaire and that the public will be fully informed of all the workings of those responsible for the suit when the proper time comes. Incidentally, it is said some highly sensational matters concerning the affairs of Dorothy Weston will be made public later.
